1. To review the current advisory process and discuss possible changes in two specific areas:

Why a "Workshop on EAF Advice"?

- a) Scoping processes, defining the problems to be addressed. Scoping processes have proven to be a core element in stakeholder participation in science based advice development. Experiences show that the process pose new problems. How can scoping processes be further developed to ensure true and transparent stakeholder participation in scientific advice?
- b) Regionalization, addressing the problems at the right scale. Engaging stakeholders at the relevant scale for EAF this includes the ecoregion scale is crucial for delivery of solutions which are legitimate, effective and efficient. Institutional limitations and the development of new regional fora have made it clear that further development is needed to achieve these goals. What are the existing shortcomings and how can regionalization be developed further to achieve the aims?
- 2. To develop improvement ideas that are doable within the current decision-making processes and available resources.

An operational report on how to address barriers for the implementation of EAFM in respect to advice.
